Paving the Way

e've all been there – circling a parking lot trying to find a parking space, growing more frustrated the longer you have to search. (And it always seems to happen at the worst times, like when you're in a rush or have antsy kids in the backseat.)

Each week, 950 families visit Aurora Food Pantry. While some take the bus or walk, the vast majority arrive in cars. Safely and efficiently moving that many cars through our parking lot is difficult on a good day; add in bad weather, runaway carts, or a dead car battery and the situation becomes even more challenging for the families as well as staff and volunteers.

Fortunately, our long-awaited parking lot expansion is underway. This project will double the number of parking spaces on site, allowing clients to access the parking lot more easily. Additionally,

a second driveway means cars will no long enter and exit in the same space. This will greatly improve traffic flow and create a safer environment for clients, volunteers, and staff.

Lighting will also be added to the parking lot, a crucial first step in a long-term goal of Aurora Food Pantry: to provide an evening food distribution. More than half of our clients have at least one employed member in their household, making it difficult for them to get to the pantry during our usual hours. Evening distribution hours will also open up new volunteer opportunities for people who work during the day and are looking for an opportunity to give back.

This parking lot project is the culmination of years of work and fundraising. We are so grateful to everyone who made this possible!







A Message from the Executive Director



The other day, we had a young woman visit the pantry for food. She kept nervously checking her watch as our volunteers and staff worked to get clients registered and into the market

to shop. Her dilemma was one that parents will know well: she was worried that she would be late to pick up her child.

We all hate to be kept waiting, but it is difficult to imagine the stress that comes from having to wait for food. While the young woman was able to get her groceries in time, we remain committed to improving our distribution process. Our parking lot expansion will help us be more efficient and responsive to the needs of our clients.

For example, one of the pantry's major goals has been to add an evening distribution for working

families. The "wait" for that is nearly over as well. While the new parking lot is the first step towards providing an evening distribution, there are still many steps to go.

A big hurdle to an evening distribution will be securing enough volunteers. We're confident the "after work" hours will free up more people to give generously of their time.
